A quorum was established per Carol & Marty Cavins. This must be at least 15% (27 members) and Carol announced that there were 99 members present. The doors had opened early and members had been checked in at the door.

Hypothermia is not cool!

Welcome to winter in the Sunny South: a great time for boating! Generally we handle temperature changes well. However all boaters should consider the risk hypothermia, which is when our inner body temperature cools. 98.6°F (36°C) is the temperature at which we function best. We generate heat to keep ourselves warm, but if our body loses heat too rapidly, things start to go wrong. Hypothermia is a big hazard for us boaters, because water conducts heat far more rapidly than air. The US Coast Guard warns that

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up to half of all drownings may involve hypothermia. Obviously this is most serious when people go into the water. Hypothermia can occur from sitting in wet clothing, or exposure to spray; this is dangerous because it sneaks up on you! Hypothermia numbs the senses and clouds thinking so a victim can have serious symptoms without realizing they are succumbing. Any time the wind chill is below 50°F, hypothermia can develop, starting with mild symptoms like numbness, slurred speech, clumsiness, heavy prolonged shivering, dizziness or sleepiness. If prolonged, exposure is symptoms can get worse. When the temperature is colder, symptoms develop more quickly and with increasing severity. A sign of a medical emergency is when shivering for then vour body's stops, mechanism to cope is failing. hypothermia victims Sometimes actually begin to feel warmer, and may want to remove their warm clothing. Another symptom increasingly severe hypothermia is nausea. Treating mild or moderate hypothermia is easy:

- 1. Remove victim from exposure
- 2. Dry the victim
- 3. Wrap them in dry towels or blankets or spare clothing without jostling to prevent abnormal heart rhythms
- Give warm drinks but NOT alcohol or caffeine.
 Warm drinks combat hypothermia by warming the body from within and by rehydrating the victim.
- 5. Contact emergency personnel.

Breathing warm air is good; hand dryers in a public restroom or a heater will help. Hypothermia is serious when the victim is vomiting, incoherent, or unconscious. Cardiac complications may occur, even in young, athletic victims. The foil

emergency blankets sold by campingequipment suppliers are helpful. Hypothermia can kill. As boaters and sailors, we should know about the risks and be prepared to cope with any event.

Pamlico Cruise October 23 – 31, 2019




October is a prime time for cruising in North Carolina, temperatures generally are comfortable and the weather reasonably stable. In the event, five boats, three sail and two power set out leaving 1N at about 10:30 heading for South River.

We had a smooth trip down river, mostly under power with light winds and anchored off the Lukens Cemetery in South River. The first splash and then a comfortable night at anchor were enjoyed by all.



We were accompanied by a range of fauna on the trip. In addition to the human variety, we had a dog, a parrot and two frogs that lived in the cockpit drains of Vital Spark.



One of the sailboats, *Silver Bullet*, draws 6.5 feet with a 68 foot mast. This presents significant challenges in the NC Rivers and on the ICW. So, *Silver Bullet* went out into Pamlico Sound and took the channel through



Brant Island Shoal into Pamlico River. There is little if any extra distance involved in taking this option. The rest of us headed from the Neuse River, round Maw Point, up the Bay River and the Cut to the Pamlico River. We motored up the Pungo River to River Forest Marina in Belhaven. Henry Frazer, the dock master, was there to greet us and shepherd us into slips. We had two nights here to recover from our adventures so far. The first night was a splash night and the second was a visit to the farm-to-fork Spoon River restaurant.



By this stage the wind was still light or non-existent so we motored up the Pamlico River and went into Bath Creek for the night. The plan was to explore Bath, the first capital of North Carolina. Unfortunately, it decided to rain so a splash was in order. Continuing on to Little Washington, we had rain and lots of wind and reached the Washington City docks by mid-afternoon. The next day we went to visit Pacific SeaCraft at their facility Washington. When they setup their business in NC, it took 22 tractortrailer loads to move all the molds and tooling from California. They looked busy both renovating older boats and building new boats.



After Washington we headed to Pamlico Plantation where we were guests of the Pamlico Plantation Yacht Club. Their hospitality was superb and they organized a barbeque for us with about 50 people attending.

Fortunately, we had contributed ten slabs of spareribs.



The rain did not detract from the enjoyment of the event. We have invited the PPYC to visit us in Fairfield Harbour so we can return their hospitality.

Next morning, we left early heading for the Neuse and lower Broad Creek. We had no wind down the Pamlico River but then as we headed into the Bay River and round Maw Point, the wind picked up from northeast. This creates an the unpleasant chop rounding Maw Point and we had a rough ride round into the Neuse River and then into Broad Creek. Since it was the last night, we decided to visit the "fleshpots" of River Dunes and have dinner in their fine restaurant. As usual, it was excellent.

For the last day, the wind was due to pick up from the southeast and we left early hoping to get home before the wind really developed. Of course, this did not happen and after rounding Wilkerson Point, we had 20-30 knots of wind from the south and an exciting run home. At one point we found we could sail at 4 knots under bare poles. We got there with no incidents and all could relax and agree that it had been an excellent cruise.
